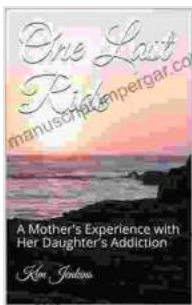


Mother's Experience With Her Daughter's Addiction

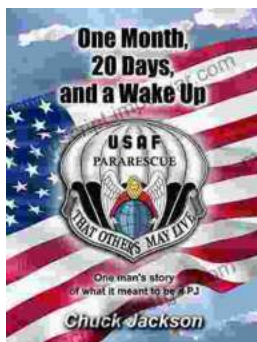
